The pressures of living 24/7 in a small family home with children not being at school, mums, and dads either both trying to work at home or suddenly not going to work has created huge pressures and torn apart any *love'* shared, often resulting in domestic violence. The LA Domestic violence hotline saw significant increase in 2020.

Some of us have struggled, but nothing compared to so many others that had so little in the first place. It is time for us to dig deep, girls!

Volunteers arrived with their husbands and one son and we unloaded the truck in record time. Our storage area at Ladera Linda looks so much neater.

PHILANTHROPY NEWS

INVITE FROM TOBERMAN

Dear Las Candalistas,

I hope this finds you doing well! I wanted to send a quick update on what Toberman has been up to since the pandemic started just over a year ago. We pivoted immediately and started to provide many of our programs virtually so that our community members were able to access the much needed services. We are constantly updating our programs based on the needs of our clients. To meet the challenges during the COVID-19 pandemic, Toberman Neighborhood Center has adapted and expanded in the following ways:

- Went from seeing an average of 152 clients a month before the pandemic to seeing 423 per month through our Family Source Center.
- Created a new WiFi Club, supporting students with distance learning through free onsite internet access for all students. In addition, we have given out 75 hot spots for youth to access the internet at home. Toberman assists students with access to technology by offering laptop lending for 50+ youth along with computer classes for parents to support their children.
- Distributed 52,000+ meals since the onset of the pandemic through daily Grab & Go community meals to combat increased food insecurity.
- Transformed our food pantry to a Mobile Food Pantry, delivering weekly groceries directly to the homes of 500+ families.
- Distributed COVID relief funds in partnership with the Mayor's Fund. Awarding over <u>two million dollars</u> to 2,500 families for rental and utility assistance, debit cards, and grocery cards, to ensure children will have access to food and be able to stay in their homes amidst record unemployment.
- Pivoted after-school programming to provide virtual tutoring, mentoring, enrichment classes, and civic engagement to continue supporting students' educational goals and provide a needed social outlet.

• Purchased a 90 foot canopy to cover our parking lot so that we may continue to safely meet clients and offer classes. The weather has been an issue and has damaged the poles and tarp numerous times however with a commitment to safety we continue to fix and replace the parts so that we may continue to see clients and offer classes.

We've partnered with Providence Community Health who has not only provided flu shot clinics for community members, but most recently, they brought a COVID-19 Vaccine Clinic for our friends 65+. We have partnered with Heal360 Urgent care who is at our campus daily, providing community members with free Covid-19 testing, Rapid Antigen testing as well as Rapid Antibody testing!

During the month of January, our Gang Prevention staff work with their youth to educate them on MLK Jr's "I Have a Dream" speech. They then asked the youth to write their own "I Have a Dream" letter. Youth wrote everything from wishing to have their own bike so they can get out and exercise with their friends during the pandemic, to wanting to travel the world as a DJ and write about their travels. One young man wrote that he wished he had a streaming camera as he's learning how to stream and thinks that could be a source of income so he can help his mom! In February, Toberman staff wanted to make those dreams come true in a magical way! Youth and their families were invited to campus to read their letters. They staff asked the youth to come to Toberman to read their letters. Unbeknownst to the youth, upon reading their letters, they would be presented with a gift that represented their dreams. It was an amazing event that put smiles (and tears of joy!) on the faces of everyone which was nice to see after the year we have all had!

It's been quite the year! We are now preparing for the day when we can welcome youth and their families back on campus for in-person programming and services. I'll be sure to send an update once that happens.
